Frequently Asked Questions regarding strike action

- UNISON members who are pregnant at work, or on maternity leave, will receive an exemption
 from strike action. Exemptions will also be given to those demonstrating they are in their last
 year of service. Please contact the branch office to request an exemption if this applies to you.
- An employee who is not contractually required to work because of sickness can still be viewed
 as taking part in a strike if he or she associates him or herself with the strike. The member
 should be very careful that actions whilst on sick leave (e.g. attending a picket) are not
 inconsistent with the member's reason for being on sick leave.

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
